Things have been very busy with the task force and project team over the last few weeks.

We are proceeding to plan for the workshops.

We've identified the workshops that we intend on holding, have identified candidate attendees for each of those.

Specific focused work shops.

We have one planned for later this week.

The lesson is learned.

A workshop will be taking place on Friday.

And we expect to schedule the remainder of the workshops during the weeks of December 9th and December 16th.

We also have the last Community listening session.

Which actually was rescheduled to December 6th, and that'll be the one that'll focus on.

Those attendees that may need.

Languages other than English or additional language support.

We also have the MCP team primarily is working diligently on putting together the inventory and assessment report. That is one of the key deliverables of the project. And that is ongoing.

We have rescheduled that.

Delivery of that document. It is scheduled for delivery via draft on the 29th of this month, so week from Friday.

We expect to receive the draft.

Mcp is already shared an outline and some of the preliminary content.

With some of the project team, so we've had a chance to review that and comment on it. We expect it to be a quite substantial document with a lot of information.

And and we'll have a quick turn around to review that.

You may know that the 29th will be day after Thanksgiving, so.

On Black Friday, we're receiving the the draft and we're committed to reviewing that and turning around comments within a week. And then MCP will update that and publish the final document in the middle of December.

Based on that, we are also adjusting schedule for the system.

Planning report, which is a primary report for the project.

We are planning to get.

Two draft.

Sessions in involved are incorporated, I should say so that we can have a mature draft to.

Distribute for public comment.

Comment from the legislatures. So we expect to have a first draft in January and then a second draft turned around by the end of January so that we will have the majority of the February time frame for extended review again by the public legislature, other first responders ET.

So some.

Major updates to to the schedule but added in additional comment and review period.

There so we'll.

Wanna make sure we have sufficient input from.

All interested stakeholders during that period.

I believe that's the majority of the work that's going on.

The cybersecurity assessments are also ongoing.

I do want to point that out, and maybe MCP has a little bit more detail to provide, but that's what I have.

That opted not to participate because they were concerned with the possibility that security information may get released as a result.

So it's just that.

Little bit under half of the agencies participated in that.

Really front and Center for the task force in the coming months. It's going to obviously this inventory report is very different from the planning document. The report, you know, articulating options for a path forward and what MCP has found. That's a different document. The the inventory report.

Contains a lot of information that agencies are not going to want.

Shared publicly.

For very good reasons, it's going to be.

A challenge to balance what we can and can't release from the inventory report.

Obviously the the real meat and potatoes, which is the path forward.

And recommendations document.

Is going to be less sensitive, one would imagine.

There may be some redactions required, but I just want to set the table of expectations that task force members are going to receive.

An inventory report that for the short term is going to be a a draft and B not not to be forwarded and not to be shared publicly.

And until we determine and our legal teams determine which portions of that very technical document can be released publicly, so just want to keep that real clear that this is not a a, a document that the task force is authorized to share. And we do have a quick.

Turn around time for the inventory report.

We'll we'll get to the issue of the big what's called the big report for now later but I do anticipate there will be.

People who want to have unfettered access to these documents, and we're going to have to apply the correct legal analysis and.

Protect agency and state information as appropriate.

To to defend against would be saboteurs and others. So.

So we're going to need some guidance on how to document it now.

We will get public records requests for it and our team is already examining.

You know absent seeing the content of it they can't make final answers but.

They're they're taking a look at whether or not.

There's a lot of potential path forward Rick is the short answer.

One could be that the entire document is withheld and determined to be confidential and and subject to the exemptions in the Vermont public records act.

There are other but there's obvious way there's obvious groups that we need to share it with eventually right.

So are we going to need to create?

A.

Properly impaneled group that has permission to see the document.

Use the document but not share it so that they can make decisions around the final report and the path forward, and what investments need to be made where. So it's going to be a tricky balance that we're, we've got folks, you know, working on it anticipating but for.

#### Morrison, Jennifer 12:29

The short term.

For this body, the report is confidential.

It is in draft form, so it is not a final form and it you're not. It is the property of mission critical partners with.

Input from our our stakeholders across the state that we have implored to cooperate with us so that we can fulfill the mission that the legislature gave us.

We cannot be sloppy and turn around and let that information that may be sensitive become public.

If it's potentially injurious to those agencies or to the state, so my word of caution for the inventory report, and I'm only talking about this very technical document, is that everybody understands it's a draft.

It is confidential at this point until our legal teams tell us something else and we will have to figure out what the future once that's a final report.

How do we allow the right people access to it?

In a way that is productive and gets us towards the end goal without it becoming something that we find on the Internet and could be harmful so.

So this first draft should be marked every page at the footer confidential. State of Vermont or State of Vermont.

Confidential information draft.

I mean we want to be sure that that we document it carefully so that we give mcp guidance on how to deliver it and and what they should put and I I'd suggest with what you just said Jen that you know draft confident state of Vermont confidential inform.

Or whatever or however best to do it. But.

I'd say that first dress should be marked accordingly.

Currently, the document has a draft watermark on it.

If the state would so like us to also add, you know, confidential or some other language that's taken from the Vermont public records.

I mean I think just be thinking about that from MC PS part so that we can see we already looked at it's hundreds and hundreds and hundreds of pages and.

It didn't include Scott's maps yet, so those are going to be many, many megabytes megabits of data.

So just logistics of delivering it needs to be thought through.

### SN Scott Neal 15:29

Yeah. So if I could just jump in on it real quick, Rick.

So I'm actually looking at where we're at right now.

It's at 679 pages and it's it's not yet completed.

So to your point it's going to be huge now not to be so intimidating.

There's a lot of appendices with very lengthy tables and there's lot of charts and graphs and maps and things in there.

So it's it's not a, it's not going to be an 800 page document of text, but we have an FTP server.

We can provide a download link to whoever wants needs that document, and you can download it on your computer.

Obviously we can't e-mail and just one thing. Jen and Barb, just for consideration as you're doing your legal review. And just to note here. So there's going to be a lot of information about critical infrastructure in there specific to your radio sites as you're talking to your attor.

The the information that's there is is technically publicly available through the FCC if somebody is sophisticated enough to be able to go in and do that.

But I would argue against disclosing that even though it is technically publicly available because.

We're gonna be giving all that information, coordinates, everything in this report. So I would argue, don't make it easy for somebody. You know, I that stuff to my opinion needs to be redacted, withheld. And if somebody wants to go to the trouble or go through the FCC and.

Get you know, figure out how to do it on their own.

But that's just my food for thought there. When you're talking to your attorneys about it.

We absolutely understand those concerns and deal with it pretty much daily at the 901 board.

So I'll have the same line of thinking in those conversations.

So. So it sounds like we're going to have a link to the document.

So when when it's available, we will, we're going to have to make sure we know how to distribute that link.

Because there won't be anyone around for support right on the day after Thanksgiving.

So so we can make the link accessible to anybody and send it in an e-mail. You can just forward that e-mail to whomever you need to, and that link should provide download.

You know the downside of that is without specifying, you know, an e-mail address is that you have to be very careful with that that link and make sure it only stays in certain hands.

At the end of the day, we have to figure out this issue of how much of, if any, of that inventory report will become public and you know it is a constant balancing act and we always strive to be as transparent as possible.

It's going to be a very very heavy lift for our team to redact a document of this size with this much technical information.

In it. So even if we are able to make portions of it public and redact other portions, it's going to take far more than the usual three days with a 10 day extension for my team to handle this.

So I'm just making sure that expectations are clear, that we will be as transparent as we can be. And then in the long run, there's the bigger question of how do we find a safe?

Secure way to to share the technical parts that would be redacted for the public. With the right people, and we're gonna obviously have to get some guidance from the legislature as to how to do that.

Because what's the next step after we deliver the the goods that we've been assigned to to deliver.

So questions that will tackle as they come, but I just wanna make sure that everybody's aware that this is gonna be a bit of a booger. The whole public records part of this inventory report.

Need to talk to us about? So there will be one that is more of a a global because these are folks who have a much deeper understanding of the topic and have followed it for a long time.
